



 - Collaborating with all other providers in the local health and social care system

 - Additional practice staff to support Primary Care Network delivery






Introducing	Primary Care Networks Oxfordshire Clinical Commissioning Group				
31 January 2018	Primary Care Networks (PCNs) announced by NHS England based on evidenced models				
Feb-May 2019	PCNs develop from the building blocks of GP practices to cover population of 30-50,000.				
	Each PCN develops a Network Agreement and appoints a Clinical Director				
1 July 2019	19 PCNs covering Oxfordshire through a national template contract				
	PCNs offering coordinated Extended Hours Access				
First year	PCNs appointing clinical pharmacists and social prescribing link workers				
Future	From 2020/21 PCNs must collaborate with non-GP providers through their Network Agreement.
